One Year of Free Composting Service for Nahant Residents

On August 7th, Nahant Selectmen allocated funds to extend the free composting program called Island Gold and SWIM donated funds to provide <u>free</u> stainless-steel countertop bins to those who enroll. If we reach a total of 200 customers of Black Earth Compost Company, <u>the cost for all other composters will drop from \$3.08 per week to \$2.69 per week!!</u> We have 155 composters now, just 45 to go! Nahant Johnson School has joined the composting movement.

This summer SWIM suggested that the school start composting. Immediately Principal Kevin Andrews signed up and said: "Black Earth Composting program is having a very positive impact on our school. Instead of sending compostable material to incinerators where it releases carbon dioxide, or to landfills where it could turn to methane, our students are able to help send it to a farm to be turned into a valuable soil component."

SWIM Monitors Swampscott's King's Beach Sewage Pollution

Last year we alerted and are now collaborating with our Selectmen and Town Administrator on the issue of contamination of our shores and Egg Rock (a nature preserve) by sewage pouring out into Nahant Bay north of Nahant. There is a disturbing proposal for a one-mile-long <u>raw</u> sewage outfall pipe which would end close to our northern shore. This is a <u>regional</u> issue, and SWIM will stay alert to news in its capacity of guardian of our fragile environment. Do not use poison to kill rodents!

If you are putting down poisons to kill rats and mice you might have already killed pets and wildlife because rodenticides are slow killers which cause internal bleeding and a slow and painful death, making them easy prey. Even worse, a small child could get hold of some of the poison. Animals and birds which eat poisoned rodents can also slowly bleed to death because the poison remains in the rodents' bodies. Second-Generation Anticoagulant Rodenticides (SGARS) are especially cruel. To eliminate rodents, we must eliminate trash. Bags of trash on the sidewalk invite rodents and coyotes to dinner. Trash should always be placed in proper trash barrels. Support Mass Audubon and New England Wildlife Centers in their support of State Legislation to control use of rodenticides. Our President regularly attends the Outfall Monitoring Science Advisory Panel (OMSAP) meetings whose purpose is to advise the EPA and the Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection (MADEP) on scientific and technical matters related to the Massachusetts Water Resources Authority's Boston outfall and any potential impacts of the discharge on its receiving waters. Our President is also a member of the watchdog committee called Public Interest Advisory Committee (PIAC) which monitors OMSAP.

We believe that collaboration is vital to our mission to protect our environment, and we are grateful for our partnerships with our Town Administrator, Selectmen, Library, Nahant Garden Club and Nahant Historical Society.

SWIM's ongoing initiatives include education of the public, participation in regional environmental seminars, standing up for the environment, acting as a first responder to threats to our beautiful environment here in Nahant, and serving as a resource for the public about environmental concerns.
